Gympie, Queensland

The destination

Gympie's main street, Mary St, offers a wide array of bars, cafes, banks and stores with stunning 19th century Victorian architecture. The historic Railway Hotel was built in 1915 and the Gympie Town Hall with its 1890 clock tower is also on the Queensland Heritage Register. Gympie's CBD offers a fantastic blend of shopping and heritage. You can enjoy the specialty shops and cafes or from Mary Street, wander through the mosaic theatres of war in Memorial Lane to Memorial Park, with its huge Hoop Pine and historical band rotunda. Restored buildings from the gold rush era add character and charm to Gympie. All this is a short walk from the conference venue.

Close in to Gympie are some wonderful outdoor escapes. Just 15 minutes SE are Mothar Mountain rock pools, which are a popular haven during summer. The Woondum National Park features rainforest waterfalls and is ideal for exploring by foot or car. Facilities include picnic tables, barbecues, firewood, fresh water, amenities and bush walking tracks. Access is by dirt road and requires a 4WD vehicle. A little further south you come across the Noosa Trails Network that leads you around Kin Kin and Pomona. These can be explored by foot, on mountain bikes or horseback. They pass through a mixture of private and public lands and feature lookouts and rest stops at convenient and picturesque intervals.

Further south, you follow the Mary River and discover country markets, art and craft and country hospitality in the valley's towns. Kenilworth features a great cheese factory with tours and tastings. The area also features Mt Mee and Mt Glorious with their timber stands and gantry now preserved in easily accessible national parks. There's also Brisbane itself, Australia Zoo, and the hinterland weekender towns of Maleny/Montville/Mapleton with arts and crafts, great food and markets, Devonshire tea, nature walks, waterfalls and a network of B&Bs.

Just east of Gympie is Tin Can Bay. To get there you pass the laminex plant and the vast exotic pine forests on the old coastal plains of Cooloola. This area is mostly sandy with occasional volcanic peaks, including the great lookout of Mt Wolvi featuring a still operational fire tower. At Tin Can Bay the main attractions are boating and fishing. You can also hand feed rare Indo-Pacific hump-backed dolphins right at the water's edge. The feeding is managed for the protection of the dolphins.

A little further east and you come to Rainbow Beach and Inskip Point, which provide open beach access with beach driving north to Fraser Island and south to Noosa. You can climb a sand blow or even take the 100km+ Great Walk to Noosa or just do a smaller section to Lake Poona, which is surrounded by forests of tall rainforest timbers. Adventurers can go diving at Wolf Rock, climbing Double Island Point to visit the historic lighthouse, or parachute onto the beach.

At the mouth of the Noosa River is the famous Hastings St strip and Noosa's Main Beach. This is an ideal spot for a pre - or post conference get away. Self-contained apartments along the river at Noosaville are perfect for families too. You can walk in the Noosa Heads National Park and watch the famous surf break or the abundant local koalas. Further south still lies the whole of the Sunshine Coast with seemingly endless perfect beaches and all manner of tourist facilities.

South East Queensland has more than enough to fill your holiday. Still need more to do? Take a trip to Stradbroke Island, Dreamworld, the Gold Coast or go horse riding and mountain climbing in the Scenic Rim.

Peter de Marsh


Peter de Marsh is a small family forest owner and farmer in the Province of New Brunswick, Canada.

Peter has worked with family forest owner associations in New Brunswick, Canada, and internationally since 1971:

- Local associations in New Brunswick: initial organisation, timber marketing and forest management education and support programs.
- New Brunswick Federation of Woodlot Owners, President; then Manager: government relations, policy and budgets; timber processing initiatives.
- Canadian Federation of Woodlot Owners: founding President (1989 - present); Federal income tax policy, forest management budgets, forest certification, carbon trading.
- International Family Forestry Alliance: member of the first Executive Committee (2002-present); Vice-Chair, then Chair; UN Forum on Forests; The Forest Dialogue's Investing in Locally Controlled Forestry dialogues; association development in China.

He is founding President (2007- 2012) of Nashwaak Valley Wood Energy Inc., a manufacturer of wood pellets for the local home heating market, formed by 120 family forest owners and other local investors.

He has a B.A. from University of Toronto in Political Science and Economics, and an M.A. from Carleton University in International Affairs and Rural Development.

Conference Field Trips

The highlight of any AFG Conference is often the field trips, and Gympie should not be any exception. Field trips are geographically and subjectively, diverse. Travel distances are modest enabling lots of being 'in the field' as opposed on the bus!

The Field trips will leave from Nelson Reserve (see map P10) on Tuesday 16 October at 8:00am and return by 5:00pm, well in time for the conference dinner. Morning and afternoon teas and packed lunches will be provided. Field trips will require some walking so wear suitable enclosed footwear and always come prepared for any weather option. While protective safety gear will be provided delegates are reminded that mills and forests require you to wear a hat, sensible clothes and appropriate footwear. Shuttle buses will operate from the normal pick up points to Nelson Reserve.

An outline of each field trip is below. A full itinerary will be provided in the Conference papers and on AFGs website. You must nominate your first and second preferences on the Conference registration form. AFG reserves the right to cancel, reallocate, or vary the field trips due to circumstances which may include lower than expected numbers, access issues or some other event.

Tuesday 16 October 2012 – Full Day Field Trips

Araucaria Tour

Seeing the growing and milling of this important native softwood species as well as some hardwood plantations.

Southern Pine and Processing Tour

There are several processors (MDF board, yellow tongue chip board and wet and dry milling) of the largest pine plantations in Queensland, which surround Gympie. You'll get a chance to get up close and personal with both growing and using this resource.

3. Mary Valley Plantation Tour

Inspecting agroforestry options along the Mary River, which includes the area that was proposed for inundation by the Traveston Dam; note, this tour includes some walking.

4. Plantation Hardwood Through the Ages

Taking a look at the original government joint venture, giant Gympie Messmates in state forest, early plantation trials and more recent hardwood plantings; note this tour includes some moderate walking.

Dry Sclerophyll Private Native Forestry

Inspecting milling, large private forests with permanent growth plots and integrated grazing and pole production mainly from Spotted Gum.

6. Wet Sclerophyll Forest

Visiting the Blackbutts growing in the mountains as well as local milling and fire management sites.


AFG SEQ 2012 will be providing a limited shuttle bus service for the conference delegates. Unless demand (as notified on the registration form) suggest otherwise one route will operate from the accommodation at the Gympie Woodworks Museum and Interpretive Centre to the Gympie Civic Centre via Gympie Pines, the Mary Valley Motel and Gympie Muster Inn on the mornings of 15 and 17 October and to the Nelson Reserve on 16 October and return via the same routes in the afternoons. In addition buses will run on this route to and from the dinner and Icebreaker (see map page 10). People not staying on this route should ensure they have access to their own transport.

Travel to Gympie can be organised through several methods. You should do your own research on this issue. However the following thoughts are shared;

- Gympie is two hours by car from Brisbane airport;
- there are limited train services from Brisbane to Gympie (www.queenslandrails.com.au);

- there are flights to Hervey Bay and buses to Gympie;
- Greyhound buses run to Gympie from Brisbane.
